Done With Camping

Zack had trouble finding work and providing for his girlfriend. His drug habit did not help matters. He is the product of a broken home, and the negative influence of a grandfather. Zack was taught drug use as a coping mechanism and way of life. He met his girlfriend through an online social media site by a friend. He said, "The camera doesn't tell you everything. It doesn't show you their personality. Its like having a co-worker, but outside of work, they're not the same." He moved in with her and her parents. His lack of income did not affect his housing, until her parents divorced



and sold the house. Zack and his girlfriend couched surfed for a couple of months, until they wore out their welcome. Then they went camping. She stayed a couple of weeks, but conditions became unbearable.

"I felt abandoned, depressed, lost. I needed companionship, somebody there. Its scary to be out there alone and camping. You don't realize how noisy nighttime is. It was hard to sleep," Zack recalled. "I would rather smoke a bowl than deal with life." He missed meals regularly, and lived on food box handouts. He said, "I've had canned, stewed tomatoes for breakfast, cold spaghetti sauce for lunch."

Enough was enough, Zack was done with camping. He said, "I didn't know how to put a resume together. I didn't know where to start." While out and about, he met a Mission staff member who directed him here. We helped him with his resume, which was more impressive than expected. Zack said, "I joined the Program because I needed a place to grow, and I have skills that could help here. I needed to work on me for a while, helping me with my mind-set. The Mission is like a misfit family. I appreciate the fact that you get a chance to get somewhere, a step up. I'm thankful for this place to stay, structure. I have rules teaching me how to live, to have a normal lifestyle."

"Chapel is getting me to think about life, and what I've done wrong, and why I need to get back in my faith. I used to preach in a church and was going to go to Bible college. I know that God is always there to help me, and I'm not alone," Zack stated.

No One Should Go Hungry At Thanksgiving

Nate had a bright future. He was a paramedic and had started a family. Then snap! While out with friends, one of the men slapped his own girlfriend. Nate reacted to defend the woman, assaulting the man. "My instincts were wellfounded, but I was in trouble," he recalls. "I had to go to jail, lost my job and EMT Certification, and couldn't see my daughter. It was difficult to find work with my record. It wasn't long before I was at the Roseburg Rescue Mission.

Nate completed the required anger management course, but passing a background check for work was a huge hurdle. In time, he was able to get his criminal record expunged. Meanwhile, Nate learned to cook from the Mission's Kitchen Supervisor.

"The Mission helped give me a sense of rebuilding and purpose," Nate says. "Chapel was so positive, and it helped me overcome the negative thoughts about my life's strange twist." Nate found hope in an unforgiving world. He has reunited with his family. "I don't think I could have made it without the help of Mission staff and volunteers," he says.

Mission Buys A House

For Samaritan Inn Transitional Housing

A picture of the house and its location are not provided here. We have a concern that property values in that area would increase greatly, if it were known that we have an interest in future purchases. Still, we want to share this good news of a significant development here. Donors deserve to know what events are happening in their Mission. The down payment was made from an estate planning donation, and the remodel costs are covered by a private foundation grant. Loan payments are being made from the transitional housing rent income. In that sense, no general funds were expended on this house.

Transitional housing for homeless women and children at Samaritan Inn is an important link in the continuum of care to permanent housing. Recidivism of clients that fail after launching will be reduced. This supportive housing stabilizes people with mental health issues, substance abuse disorders, domestic violence trauma, justice system involvement, illness, disabilities. There is more private space and less common space. Yet clients still have full access to our Samaritan Inn campus, staff, and services. Its a step of learning independent living skills and gaining confidence. Unlike our shelter, one has to buy groceries, stock shelves and a refrigerator, cook meals, clean dishes, have a budget plan, pay affordable rent. Accountability is present, but the level of independence is increased.

Some mothers with children, that are ready to leave our shelter, are still required by the Department of Human Services to have a Safety Service Provider. They cannot move to an unsupervised location and maintain custody of their children. Our transitional housing has that supervision. Many mothers are with their children here, because four requirements of having custody are met: 1) to have a home like setting, 2) have a safe environment, 3) have a Safety Service Provider, 4) the mother engages in her treatment program. We are also a place for DHS to have observed visits of a mother with her child working on getting custody restored. As DHS Foster Care struggles to have enough parents, Samaritan Inn has a greater role in meeting the needs of families.

Future expansion of the Mission is with increasing services to women and children. It is to be more proactive in reducing homelessness and

restraining the generational cycle of abuse. Samaritan Inn has 104 beds, consisting of 17 family rooms, a single women's dormitory, a special needs section, and a program area. In addition to that, we now have a house, yet to be remodeled and occupied, that will have about six more beds.
